# Spring 2011 Mission Trip to Eastern Kentucky



Chapel Center Mission Team at St Timothy's Outreach Center, Irvine, KY

Mission team members from the University Chapel Center @ USF recently traveled to Irvine, Kentucky to assist the Episcopal diocese of Lexington with outreach efforts in eastern Kentucky.

St Timothy's Episcopal Outreach Center is located on Barnes Mountain in Estill County, southeast of Lexington. The center has existed since 1982 to serve the people of Barnes Mountain and

the surrounding areas and to help minister in the lives of residents in such a way that they improve physically, emotionally, and spiritually.

The opportunity to visit and work from the Outreach Center is open to those wanting to serve in eastern Kentucky, regardless of church affiliation. Activities at the Center include: home repair and improvements, day camps for local children and youth, community meals, food pantry, clothing bank, distribution of used appliances, and construction of wooden caskets.

The Chapel Center team worked under the supervision of St Timothy's director Fr Bryant Kibler on local home projects, which included repairing floor boards, laying new flooring, and painting. On Tuesday night during their visit team members assisted with a community meal, helping with food preparation and visiting with local residents. The trip was a great opportunity not only to help in a tangible way but also to learn about the history and culture of Appalachia.

A few weeks ago, we spent some time at St. Timothy's Episcopal Outreach Center in Irvine, Kentucky. The five people in our group arrived late on Monday night and then spent three days learning about this part of the Appalachian region, meeting local people, and working. We worked on two houses, painting walls and ceilings and putting down flooring. Considering that we were a small group, I think we accomplished a decent amount of work in three



days. Of course, the years of experience of Father Bryant Kibler, who runs the outreach center, probably helped.

When I've gone on service trips before, I was usually with groups of about 25 people. A group of only five people was certainly different, but I thought it worked well. Though we only had a few days in Kentucky, I felt that I was able to really get to know everyone else, and we could all have good conversations about what



we were seeing and our reactions to the situation. Significant poverty exists here, and we found ourselves faced with questions concerning what might be done to help these people improve their circumstances. Perhaps the most important thing is to simply realize that members of this community probably know what is needed better than we do, and we should listen openly and intently to their unique perspective and their ideas.




## Finding New Ways to Get the Word Out
